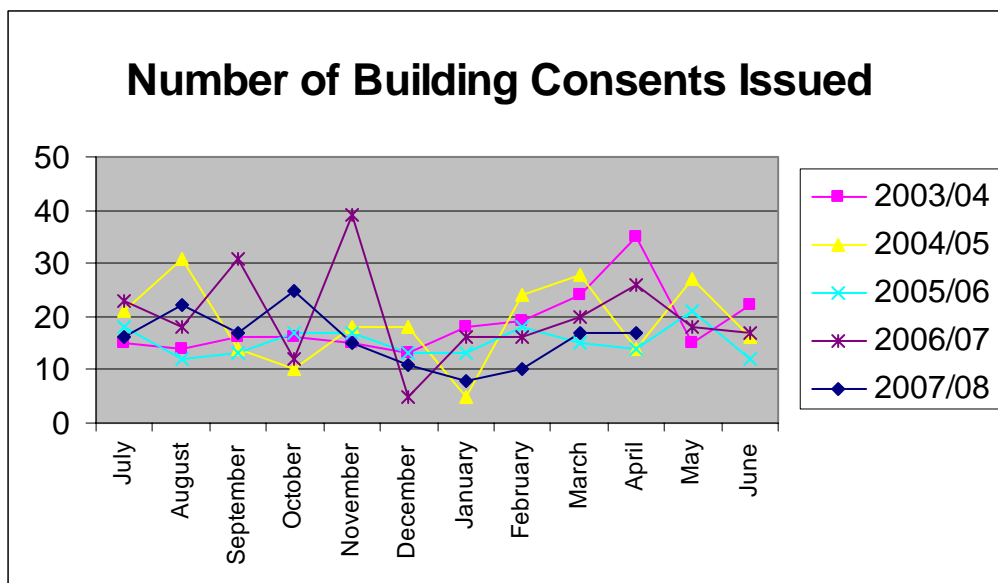
There were 17 Building Consents with a combined construction value \$697,598 issued for the month of April 2008. These consents were for:-

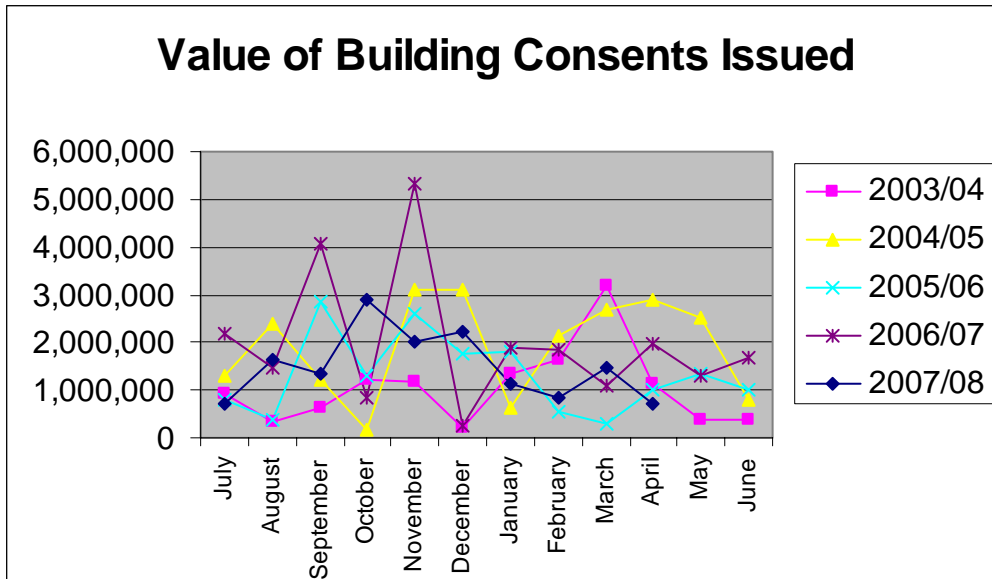
- 2 Garages

- Replacement bridge, Stoney Creek

There were 13 Code Compliance Certificates issued for completed projects in April 2008.

The total number of Land Information Memorandums being requested for the month of April 2008 was 4

Kaikoura District Council has now been awarded a certificate of accreditation. It is important to maintain momentum because IANZ will complete a full routine audit every 2 years. A reassessment for Kaikoura has been provisionally scheduled for January 2010.





• Dog/Stock/Noise Control & Security

Dog Control

1. March was an average month with 17 complaints/calls being received re dogs alone.
2. Six dogs were picked up from these calls and four were identified or had been reported missing and were returned to the owners. The other two went through the pound, fees paid and released. Three other dogs were uplifted or chased home, while doing enquiry work for unregistered dogs and the owners spoken to re their dogs roaming.
3. A complaint was received from some mountain bikers who went for a ride in a rural area and were rushed by a dog. The dog came out from the owner's property and chased them down the road. The dog owner has been spoken to and a registration matter addressed, as well as that they have been informed to fence the section so people can pass the area without the dogs having direct access to the public road. They have been warned that it may be classified if another incident occurs and I will be monitoring the address re fencing and the dog.
4. No complaints were received with regard to the recent dog control issues at Ludstone Road.
5. The other calls mostly related to dogs on the loose, barking dogs, and located dogs.

Stock Control

1. Six complaints were received re stock. Three were from the end of Beach Road, and relate to one property where the fencing is not up to standard. The owner has been spoken to and according to them a fencing contractor will be repairing the fences, I will be monitoring. The others were from riverbeds, as stock start to push out due to declining feed. With farmers assistance all were returned to secure areas.

Noise Control

1. Three complaints were received. One was served an abatement notice, one was over before we attended, some 10 minutes from getting the complaint and the other was warned and reduced the level with no further action required.

Closed Circuit Camera – West End Toilet Facility

1. The system is performing well and during the period no incidents have been reported.

• Resource Planning

Resource Consent Update: From 7th April to 14th May 2008

Seven new applications were lodged during this period. The consents are a mix of non-notified land use and subdivision consents. Work continues on several large notified resource consent applications and appeals before the Environment Court. Notified applications include:

- **DR & JF Johnson** – Chapmans Road -16 park subdivision. Notification closed on the 17th of December 2007. Granted.
- **Kaikoura Developments Limited – (Scenic Circle)** – A formal request has been received for an extension of time to allow the consent to lapse on 22 May 2013. Information has been provided from the applicants on key dates. If the extension is given construction is intended to commence in year four of the project. The application has been asked on 4 April 2008 to consult with the adjoining property owners. No response is yet received.
- **Global Property Investment** – Subdivision at Mangamaunu. Agreement has been reached with Te Runanga O Kaikoura. The applicants are currently working with NZ Historic Places Trust and it is likely that a formal hearing will no longer be required.
- **Works Infrastructure- Kowhai Ford** – Formal decision has been released, consent has been granted with conditions. Appeal period has now closed with no appeals received.
- **Realworld -100-102 Torquay Street** – 19 Residential Apartments and 4 visitors accommodation units. Application placed on hold at applicants request.
- **Realworld -100 Torquay Street** – 11 Residential Apartments – application currently on hold seeking additional information prior to notification.
- **Ngai Tahu Property Limited** –Application granted subject to conditions. Decision under appeal by applicant and submitters. Mediation has commenced between parties.
- **Midway Limited** – 4 Lot subdivision - Mill Road. Environment Court Order received consent approved for 4 Lot subdivision subject to conditions.
- **Kaikoura Investment Trust Ltd – Acacia Downs Stage II** – 25 Lot subdivision. Application publically notified submission close 13th June 2008.

The number of new resource consent and public enquires for this period has increased. The majority of work being focused on larger subdivision consents and 224 certification with an increase in land use consents.

District Plan Appeals

All appeal matters are now settled and the plan will be launched mid June.

Canterbury Regional Council

Regional Policy Statement

Drafting is now being complete on the energy and heritage and air chapters, with a staff day scheduled for the end of July. The Council was visited last month and asked for responses back for energy, heritage and the provision for the relationship of tangata whenua with resources and the draft natural hazards chapter. Feedback was provided on the draft natural hazards chapter.

Transit New Zealand

Strategic Transport Study

A final draft has been submitted to Transit for their approval, once approval is made by Transit the draft will then be submitted to Council for adoption. After adoption the document will be released to the public.

West End Working Party

Pricing is currently being undertaken and the work is scheduled to begin in the winter.

Potential Plan Changes

Business/ Industrial Zone

Council staff are currently waiting for a draft concept plan for the area including options for effluent disposal. The timing of this is dependant on the applicant.

Community for Climate Change

Solar Street Light

General feedback is still sought in relation to the solar street lights at Tom's Track and Whitby Place. The trial on these solar street lights expires on 30th September 2008. Feedback should be addressed to Matt Hoggard.

Kaikoura Draft Physical Activity Plan

Submission

A submission has also been made on the Draft Physical Activity Plan for Kaikoura. The key aspects of the submission are:

- Positive support for the physical activity plan.
- Strengthening of demographic which relate to Kaikoura.
- The importance of cycling and walking linkage for a short term goal.
- Seeing cycle and walkways as infrastructure which provides for physical activity and improves safety.

- Exploring options for joint ventures with Transit and LTNZ to achieve mutually beneficial outcomes.
- Recognizing the importance of a central location for recreation complexes and avoidance of natural hazards.
- Support for the outdoor school concept.

Kaikoura's Waste Management Plan

A further workshop needs to be undertaken as comments in the last Council meeting were contrary to conclusions drawn in the discussion workshop.

Te Korowai

The Te Korowai group is moving ahead with issues currently being compiled toward completing a strategy document. Work will continue on this with consultation being undertaken with stakeholders as required.

Proposed New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement

The submission will be presented to Council for discussion.

Composting Waste

Discussions have been held with a composting facility regarding the processing of disposable nappies. The composting facility is scheduled to be up and running in October 2008, therefore the plan is to get preschools and families on board to use the service by this date.

Kaikoura Enviroschools Activities, July 2007- May 2008

Enviroschools in Kaikoura has been building momentum since July of 2007. With 5 schools currently active in the programme, one school on hold and a new possibility opening with the kindergarten there is lots of talk of sustainability around town. The Kaikoura Enviroschools Canterbury facilitator, Valerie Lubrick, works with schools both individually and collectively supporting the school and their community with ideas, inspiration, and motivation. Paramount to Val's role is keeping the journey of being a sustainable school both manageable in easy steps and at the forefront of student's and teachers' minds.

Easily available by phone and email, Val also journeys to Kaikoura frequently to provide professional development opportunities. Here is a short summary of some of the year's highlights.

Individual schools

Kaikoura Primary

Students at Kaikoura Primary enjoyed a day at the beach as part of Sea Week studies, but were saddened to find a plastic Hamner Springs bracelet. Back in the classroom they drafted letters to Hamner Springs, encouraging the manager to consider more environmentally friendly alternatives to creating litter and a possible hazard to wildlife. The manager wrote back explaining that they would look into alternatives and that he was impressed with the students commitment. He hopes there are more young people like them around. As well, students showed their awareness and appreciation of Kaikoura’s natural environment through the art they exhibited at the A & P show in February. What great ways to combine the Enviroschools Kaupapa with school subjects! Kaikoura Primary students and staff hope to continue their vegetable garden, herb garden, building models as part of their vision map, and achieve a silver award this year.

Kaikoura Suburban

Moving Mt Fyffe from the school scenery to the forefront of the school's education plan, "Fyffe Force" has been the hot topic at Kaikoura Suburban. Through this concept teachers have incorporated Enviroschools with the values of FORCE: Fun, Organized, Respect, Communication, and Excellence. Students have designed and implemented a recycling programme which they presented to staff and parents. As a new 2008 Enviroschool, students and staff are beginning the journey towards becoming a sustainable school and aim to submit for bronze this year.

Woodbank

With a new teacher on board as of November 2007, Woodbank students will continue the work begun with their previous teacher, and carry on with new projects and learning. A recent visit by Valerie had the students considering how long it takes for various items to decompose, which tied nicely into the girls' recycling and composting programme. In terms 2 & 3 students will explore the Me & My Environment unit of the Enviroschools kit while getting to know their school environment and community.

Lynton Downs School

The students at Lynton Downs have been busy in the garden. Before their teacher Helen Deidrichs passed away in June 2006, she and the students had created personalized paving stones and created a plan to refurbish the sand box and garden area. The aim was to create an area, designed and built by students, for play that would also tie in to the schools goal of becoming a Silver status Enviroschool. With Helen's passing the project was put aside for some time until recently when the students and principal dug in and set the pavers and built up the area. This spot is now a focal point for the children and has been dedicated to the memory of Helen. Next steps, refurbish the school entranceway, explore the Me & My Environment programme, and keep on the sustainability track and submit for the Enviroschools silver award in 2008.

Kaikoura High School

With many staff incorporating Environmental for Sustainability into various curriculum areas, students are gaining a cross-curricular perspective of sustainability. Students in the Eco-Council have divided themselves in to project groups. Students are re-developing and re-landscaping the front entranceway, murals are being created, green bins are in the staff rooms and workshops and field trips are keeping students on the cutting edge of sustainability. Four students are working hard learning and growing food in the school garden. They are preparing to inspire other youth to grow their own food when they represent Kaikoura at the upcoming National Youth Jam in August in Rotorua. Best of luck to them!

St. Joseph's School principal has decided to place his school's Enviroschools commitment on hold as he and the staff finish off various Ministry of Education contracts. They will look at their commitments again in November 2008 with the aim of working towards an Enviroschools Silver award in the future.

Arbor Day.

Thursday June 5th – this is a national event to draw attention to the importance of trees in our society.

Back ground - The founder of Arbor Day was Julius Sterling Morton a member of Nebraska's Board of Agriculture. He asked for one day a year to be set aside for planting trees to help save the Great Western Plains. They had been almost totally cleared of trees. As a result the world's first Arbor Day was held in Nebraska on 10 April, 1872.

New Zealand's first Arbor Day planting took place in Greytown in the Wairarapa on 3 July, 1890. Following calls for the establishment of a day for tree planting, 4 August was designated as a holiday in government offices for Arbor Day. This country's first official celebration took place in Wellington that year.

In Christchurch, on the same day, boys from Standard 6 and 7 at Christchurch East School gathered in front of Christchurch Cathedral. The Canterbury Times reported:

At 10am four tramcars left the Square fully laden with passengers, trees, spades and provisions for the day. On reaching New Brighton they went northwards to the Selwyn Country Council's Reserve. Mr Dunlop, a local storekeeper, brought 300 trees provided by the Selwyn County Council. Pinus, maritima, muricata, macrocarpa, japonica and gallica were among the varieties of trees planted.

On the same day the school staff and children planted a thousand trees on a site fronting George St, and the Canterbury Land Association was also active nearby. There were 3000 trees planted in New Brighton on that day.

By 1930 the tradition was established in the United States, France, Norway, Russia, Japan, China and most of the Commonwealth countries. During the 1970s and 80s, the ideals of Arbor Day began to take on a global perspective as New Zealanders shared a concern over the destruction of the Earth's forests. In 1977, the date for Arbor Day was set on 5 June, World Environment Day.

Arbor Day is a special time for us to reflect on the gifts that trees give us every day.

Kaikoura District Council and Trees for Travellers are working together to coordinate a community event for Arbor day – aiming to plant 500 trees on Council reserve land at Jimmy Armers Beach. Local tourist operators have been the main aim at 'recruiting' of volunteers – the idea being to give them an opportunity to show their commitment to our local environment, offset carbon and increase local biodiversity. Levels of interest and uptake have been promising to date. Department of Conservation staff have committed time to assisting on the day and it is hoped that Environment Canterbury will also.

This would also be a great opportunity for Councillors to join in – any time is appreciated.

This year the Biodiversity Officer nominated Sally Blunt of Bay Paddock Road in the Private Land category for all the work she does on their property, which also contains 6 QEII covenants.

Sally was thankfully recognised for her efforts and won the Private Land category. She was also judged best over all and awarded the Excellence award which is great news.

Sally will be presented her awards and prizes at the June Council meeting by 'Weedbusters'.

Biodiversity Contestable Fund 08.

The Biodiversity Contestable Fund (three rounds) will be reviewed in full and reported at the June Environmental Services Committee Meeting. However as a brief overview of the successful projects of the 2008 round, they were –

- Restoration work in Wairepo Lagoon
- Blue Penguin protection work, South Bay.
- Planting and enhancement work in QEII Covenant.
- Funding for fencing of QEII covenant surrounding wetland.
- There is one further application that will be funded to a degree but awaiting further information before decision made.

• **Environmental Health**

1.0 Report Overview:

1.1 The month of April was busy with a number of liquor reports, ongoing complaints and premise inspections.

2.0 Liquor Act & Gaming Act:

2.1 The following licences were completed during the period:

4 Applications for General Manager Certificates received and processed

1 Renewal of a General Manager Certificate received and processed

3 Special Licence application received and processed

- Kaikoura Bridge Club
- Kaikoura Collie Dog Club
- Kaikoura Golf Club

2.2 A very clear message has been given to all licensed premises - **NO ID ... NO SERVICE**. I will continue to raise the profile of the Act and its importance during my food assessments and liquor inspections.

2.3 David Shovel will be following up the liquor ban enforcement issue directly with the Police. Clearly the emphasis must be on effective signage, enforcement and monitoring of the ban to ensure it is effective, more over appropriate. David will report his findings to Council as they become available.

2.4 David & I have been working on producing a joint agency liquor licensing newsletter detailing key initiatives that both Canterbury and KDC are actively formulating. I have invited both the Police and Community & Public Health to contribute to the publication, along with other joining Agencies to emphasize key areas of the act that play a fundamental role in administration and enforcement of the Act. These include:

- Host responsibility
- Focusing on reducing intoxication and driving while under the influence of alcohol.
- Control Purchase Operations,
- Food provision,
- Minors,
- The law
- Training and the LCQ
- Suitability
- Penalties and prosecutions

2.5 ALAC and the Police held a liquor licensing advocacy seminar which David and I both attended. The seminar was focussed around taking cases before the Liquor Licensing Authority and provided some very useful information. It was also a good opportunity to

discuss district licensing issues with representatives from other DLA's, the Police and Public Health.

3.0 Infectious Diseases:

3.1 One notifiable disease was reported in April. This related to Campylobacter. The standard questionnaire was completed for this case and a telephone interview conducted. The Medical Officer of Health has been made aware of the findings and thanked Food and Health for its diligence.

4.0 Environmental Noise & Public Health Complaints:

4.1 April was generally quiet with regard to complaints. There are ongoing issues with two accommodation providers, but again these largely relate to quality as opposed to an actual health risk. A change of management at one of these premises will hopefully address any outstanding matters. I will continue to work with these people to resolve the issues.

5.0 Registered Premises:

5.1 Premise inspections on all outstanding premises are continuing.

5.2 14 food premises were inspected under the Food Hygiene Regulations 1974. I was pleased to note the generally high standard in most of these premises.

5.3 Work is continuing to introduce the voluntary implementation of the Food Control Plans after July. These will be actively promoted in the next round of inspections starting in July 2008.

5.4 A newsletter is being developed to be sent to all registered food premises. This will cover general food safety information, as well as information regarding the voluntary implementation of Food Control Plans.

5.5 A joint visit with Community and Public Health was made to one premises, after a meal was implicated in two cases of food poisoning. Improvements that had been made before Christmas when I had a similar situation had lapsed and I am now working very closely with the owner and staff to ensure that the premises is brought up to a suitable standard, including staff education.

6.0 Water Quality Monitoring:

6.1 Please refer to the schedule of monitoring for April 2008. One transgression occurred in April.

6.2 Food and Health is continuing to take a very proactive and conscientious approach to water quality monitoring and the public health aspects attached to the maintaining safe drinking water, with the primary aim of protecting the consumers on the individual water schemes, and demonstrating compliance with the Drinking Water Standards NZ 2005.

6.3 The visit by Environment Canterbury to the April Council meeting reportedly went very well, and hopefully some improvements will be seen at Lyell Creek.

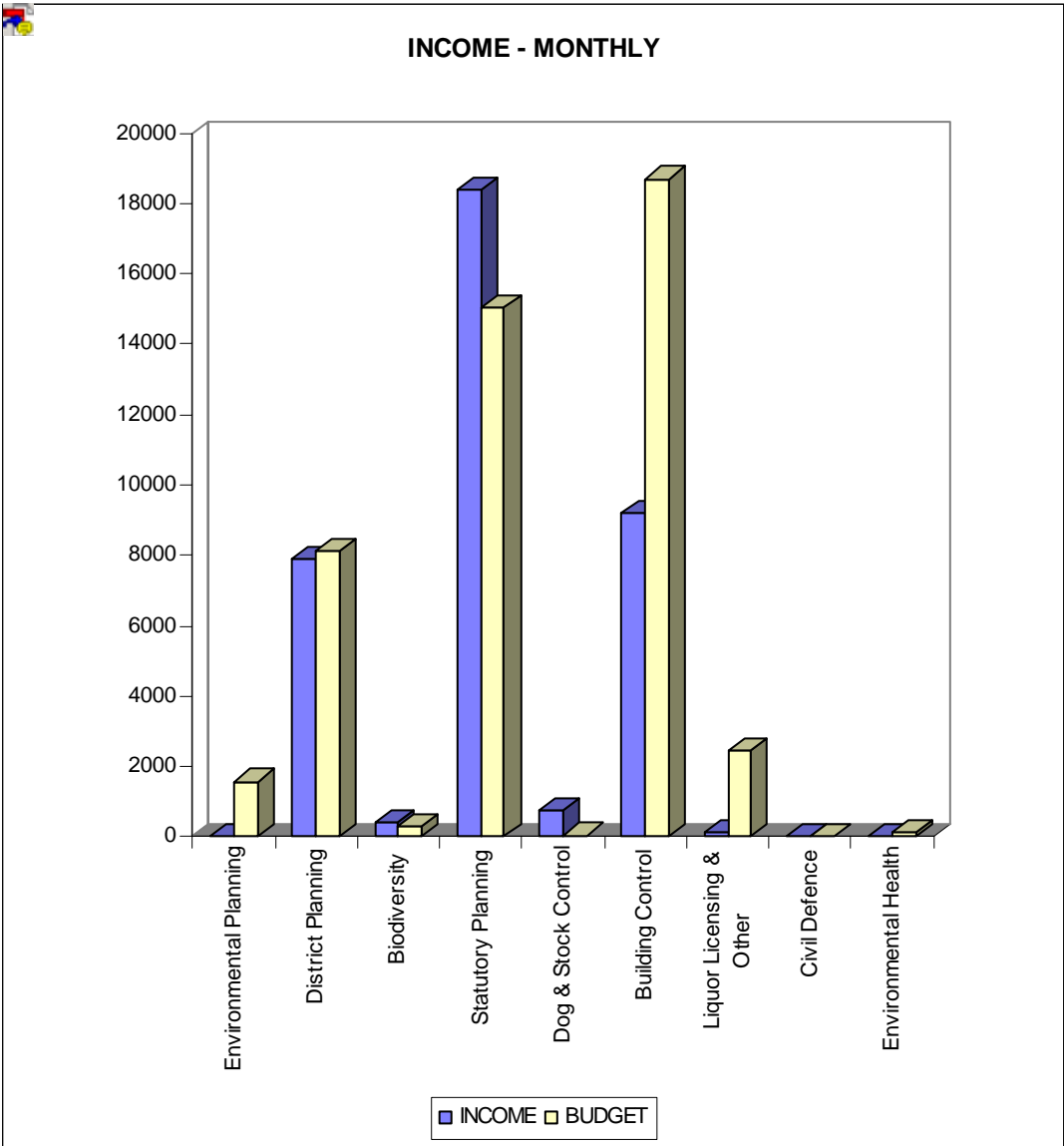
