## • **Dog/Stock/Noise Control & Security**

### **Dog Control**

1. July was an average month with twenty three complaints/calls being received regarding dogs alone.
2. Fifteen calls were for missing or roaming dogs, three dogs were picked up. All had collars and current tags so owners were contacted and warned that their respective dogs would be impounded if found at large again.
3. The remaining calls were for minor matters of barking and another of a dead dog being located on the highway, this was north on the highway and no owner has been located. The dog was removed and disposed of after being unsuccessful in locating the owner.
4. The dog in Ludstone Road is still being monitored regarding where the dog is being kept. To date we have had no calls from the complainant.

### **Noise Control**

1. Three complaints were received all from Whitby Place regarding the Churchill Street band practice, all were attended and levels checked. On each occasion the noise was not over the level set.

## • **District & Environmental Planning**

### **District Plan & Environmental Planning Report Covering July 2010**

#### **National Policy Statements**

##### Draft New Zealand Energy Strategy and Draft New Zealand Energy Efficiency and Conservation Strategy

The Government is currently consulting on a draft New Zealand Energy Strategy. Replacing the 2007 Energy Strategy, the Strategy has been updated to align with current government energy policy priorities and to reflect a stronger focus on economic development. At the same time the Government is consulting on a draft New Zealand Energy Efficiency and Conservation Strategy, a companion strategy specifically focused on the promotion of energy efficiency, conservation and renewable energy.

#### **Canterbury Regional Council**

##### Natural Resources Regional Plan

No further decisions have been released on this.

##### Regional Coastal Environment Plan

Further submissions are now closed. No summary has been received from Environment Canterbury. The pre-hearing meeting has been set for 4 September and Environment Canterbury will notify submitters of this date.

##### Regional Transport Strategy

Feedback from the Regional Council is still awaited. Of the new Environment Canterbury commissioners, Rex Williams and Tom Lambie were appointed as the regional council representatives with Rex Williams as chair.

##### Canterbury Regional Policy Statement

The workshops on the document have been completed. The workshops have occurred every Thursday and Friday for the last seven weeks in Christchurch. Each chapter of the document has been reviewed with the intention of ensuring that it provides a level of direction which reflects the expectation of Regional and District Councils. There are some areas of the document which will be addressed by further working parties including determining appropriate ecological criteria and refining of the term Historic Heritage Landscapes. However in general the document is at the stage where sufficient agreement exists between the Territorial Authorities and the Regional Council to allow for notification of this draft document. Notification is expected in early September.

#### **New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA)**

##### Beach Road and West End Intersection

Further discussions remain ongoing.

##### State Highway Route Security

Comments have been provided on the route security document and feedback is waited from New Zealand Transport Agency.

##### Truck Stop

New Zealand Transport Agency is moving towards the creation of truck stops / rest areas. Initial thoughts are that these would be located where possible at ½ hour spacing from major centres.

New Zealand Transport Agency will develop a location of possible rest areas which are truck friendly.

### **Current Plan Changes**

#### Business/ Industrial Zone

Discussions are ongoing with the landowner how to best progress this project.

#### Ocean Ridge

Notification for further submissions has occurred with the last day for further submissions being 13 August 2010. Further submissions must be limited in support of or opposition to a relevant submission and can only be made by the following parties:

- (a) any person representing a relevant aspect of the public interest; and
- (b) any person that has an interest in the proposed policy statement or plan greater than the interest that the general public has; and
- (c) the local authority itself.

Given that this Council has been dealing with the application it is anticipated that the Planning Committee will hear the matter between 16 to 24 September 2010.

It is important that any decision made by the Planning Committee is made before 8 October being the day before local body elections.

### **Community for Climate Protection (CCP)**

Ongoing work is occurring to reduce emissions and waste.

#### Street Light Reductions

Street lighting improvements will be suggested to Council once further research is undertaken.

### **Te Korowai**

The Ministry of Fisheries has agreed to extend the temporary closure of the Whakatu Quay area in Kaikoura known as the Rahui to all fishing until 17 August 2012. Although some residents have raised concern about the continued closure of the Rahui area, the group did not want to see the work of the reseeding and closure undone by reopening the area. Work is continuing on the substance of the strategy including work on future protected areas.

### **Zero Waste**

Work is continuing on waste initiatives. External funding has been obtained for new recycling bins at the High School, it is hoped that this will increase our waste diversion significantly.

### **Green Globe/Earthcheck**

A new case study on Kaikoura is available at the Earthcheck website – <http://www.earthcheck.org/en-us/wp/library.aspx>. In addition Kaikoura will be filmed as part of a documentary on sustainable communities to be premiered on Sky Television.

### **Sustainability Forum**

Staff have been invited to join Top of the South Councils to form a sustainability round-table. This gives staff the opportunity to network and see what other Councils are doing. As well as work with other Council's to achieve sustainability outcomes.

## • Biodiversity & Environmental Projects

### Keep New Zealand Beautiful Week 17-24<sup>th</sup> September 2010.

Kaikoura Westpac has again shown interest in coordinating a school based clean up as part of this initiative this year. It is anticipated a community event will be planned to run alongside this. More details to come closer to the time.

### Conservation Week 12-19<sup>th</sup> September 2010

The theme this year is 'Love New Zealand *Arohaina i a Aotearoa*'. Conservation Week 2010 is about showing that you love New Zealand. Planning is underway with Department of Conservation for a community event to celebrate Conservation Week.

### Regional Council Consent CRC102944

As noted previously, a submission was put forward to the publically notified Regional Council consent CRC102944 by District Council staff. The hearing date of 29<sup>th</sup> July has been postponed until further notice.

### Hutton's Shearwater Charitable Trust celebration.

The Trust will be holding an event late August to celebrate the completion of the predator proof fence on the peninsula, surrounding the translocation site, as a third colony. Invites will be sent to funders, donors, 'friends of', and those who have supported the Trust in this project.

### Investigation into the Establishment of a Regional Park in Kaikoura.

*'Environment Canterbury is investigating the establishment of a Regional Park on reserve lands it holds along the Kowhai River, Waimangarara River and Luke Creek. We would like to invite you to a **public meeting** to be held 5.15 pm Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> August at the Kaikoura Memorial Hall to provide an overview of the project and to discuss the areas values and issues.*

**The Food Bill 2010**

**1.0 REPORT OVERVIEW:**

This report provides Council with an explanatory overview of the new proposed Food Bill for New Zealand.

For ease of interpretation I have copied and amended specific details from the Governments information page, thus enabling Council to be fully informed of the broad-brush approach to Food Safety for the future years to come.

As part of the consultative process submissions are being invited on the proposed food bill. This report provides Council with the necessary information to allow for such a submission to be made, actively supporting (or otherwise as the case may be) the need for change and embracing the risk management approach to food safety.

**2.0 INTRODUCTION**

This Bill introduces substantial reforms to the regulatory regime for the safety and suitability of food. Once fully implemented, it will replace the Food Act 1981 and the Food Hygiene Regulations 1974.

Food presents a major risk to the health of humans because of the potential of food to transfer harmful organisms, chemical residues, and other contaminants to humans. The levels of food-borne illnesses in New Zealand are too high.

If New Zealand is to safeguard against food-borne illness, the current regulatory regime needs to be recrafted to create an efficient, modern risk-management-based regulatory regime that ensures food meets appropriate safety and suitability standards.

Many food businesses recognise this need and have taken part in lengthy consultation processes during the development of the policy for the Bill.

## **PURPOSE**

The policy objective of the Bill is to provide an efficient, effective and risk-based regulatory regime that manages domestic food safety and suitability issues. The purpose of the Bill is to—

- ❑ reform the law relating to how persons trade in food; and
- ❑ achieve the safety and suitability of food for sale; and
- ❑ provide for risk-based measures that—
  - minimise and manage risks to public health; and
  - protect and promote public health; and
- ❑ provide certainty for food businesses in relation to how the requirements of this Bill will affect their activities; and
- ❑ require persons who trade in food to take responsibility for the safety and suitability of that food.

The Bill imposes a primary duty on all persons who trade in food to ensure that the food is safe and suitable.

## **PRINCIPLES UNDERPINNING REGULATORY CONTROLS**

The following principles underpin the Bill:

- ❑ the need to achieve the safety and suitability of food; and
- ❑ the need to require persons who deal with food to take responsibility for the safety and suitability of food; and
- ❑ the need to promote standards and control mechanisms that are, as far as possible, risk-based and science-based; and
- ❑ the need for efficiency and to minimise compliance costs; and
- ❑ the importance of ensuring that regulatory requirements are applied consistently and fairly across sectors and groups, depending on factors such as risk; and
- ❑ the importance of providing services in a co-ordinated and coherent manner as far as practicable.

## **SCOPE**

The Bill sets out a comprehensive regime for food safety and suitability and applies to businesses producing food in New Zealand regardless of whether that food is intended for

the domestic market or export. The Bill also places specific requirements on persons importing food to New Zealand for commercial purposes.

### **RISK MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK**

The Bill establishes a risk management framework and provides for **4 types** of risk-based measures—

- ❑ food control plans, registered with the relevant territorial authority or the Ministry; and
- ❑ national programmes, registered with the relevant territorial authority or the Ministry as set out in regulations; and
- ❑ monitoring programmes set out in regulations to impose monitoring measures; and
- ❑ food handler guidance (educative materials) produced by the Ministry or by territorial authorities.

With the exception of food handler guidance, these measures are defined in the Bill as risk management tools, to which attach specific statutory obligations and requirements.

- ❑ The Bill goes onto require all persons who trade in food to operate under a risk management tool assigned to their sector with some restrictions.

Food control plans set out an assessment of the risks to food safety and suitability and the processes that will be followed to manage those risks. Food control plans will either be off-the-peg food control plans based on templates developed by the Ministry or be custom-made food control plans developed by the food business.

The Ministry will develop food control plan templates where there is commonality among products and processes across a significant number of food businesses and there are relatively low risks. Where a food control plan is required and the Ministry has not developed a template for the food business type, then a custom-made food control plan will be required.

A national programme is a regulation designed to identify, control, manage, and eliminate or minimise hazards or other relevant factors for the purpose of achieving safe and suitable food.

There are 3 national programmes, differing in the level of control or the set of requirements they impose. Accordingly, a level 3 national programme generally imposes a higher level of control on a food business than a level 2 or level 1 national programme, and a level 2 national programme general imposes a higher level of control than a level 1 national programme. Each national programme will apply to a number of food sectors.

Food handler guidance will be made available by the Ministry or by territorial authorities for small-scale accommodation such as bed and breakfasts, occasional activities such as fund-raising barbecues, cake stalls, and one-off events such as ethnic food festivals, and for organisers of other events that include the sale of food. Guidance materials will provide advice on good operating practices and how to eliminate or minimise risks.

### **RESPONSIBILITIES, FUNCTIONS, AND ROLES**

#### Industry responsibility

The Bill provides that a person who trades in food must ensure that the food is safe and suitable. This duty applies irrespective of whether the person is required to have a food control plan or is covered by a national programme or operates under food handler guidance.

The Bill requires food importers to register with the Ministry and makes it unlawful for an unregistered person to import food for commercial purposes, unless that person is importing the food through an agent who is a registered importer.

### **TERRITORIAL AUTHORITY RESPONSIBILITIES**

Territorial authorities have a role in the food safety regime that includes—

- ❑ delivering services that are needed to achieve the purpose of this Bill, including the provision of advice and the dissemination of information on matters relating to the safety and suitability of food; and
- ❑ facilitating the administration and performance of functions and activities that support the role of the chief executive under this Bill; and
- ❑ contributing to the implementation and delivery of risk-based measures for the safety and suitability of food; and
- ❑ performing the function of a registration authority; and

- ❑ carrying out enforcement and other regulatory responsibilities under this Bill in respect of their district; and
- ❑ carrying out the role of a recognised agency, if so recognised under this Bill; and
- ❑ carrying out any functions that are incidental and related to, or consequential upon, the roles set out above.

### **COMPLIANCE**

The Bill sets out a range of options to promote compliance with legislative requirements, food control plans, and national programmes. These include—

- ❑ enforcement powers for food safety officers; and
- ❑ the ability of a District Court to issue compliance orders; and
- ❑ enhanced penalties provisions.

The Bill also provides a registration authority with the power to—

- ❑ impose conditions on food control plans, subject to a right of review; and
- ❑ suspend all or any operations under a food control plan or a national programme, subject to a right of review; and
- ❑ cancel the registration of a food control plan, or the registration of a food business under a national programme, subject to a right of review.

### **TRANSITION**

The Bill makes provision for the new legislative regime to be implemented progressively over a 5-year transition period. Different food sectors may switch to the new arrangements at different times depending on the date set by the Governor-General, by Order in Council, for the expiry of the authorised transition period for each food sector or each class of food sectors.

The following table shows where to find the overview provisions of the Bill.

## **PART BY PART ANALYSIS**

### **INTERPRETATION AND INTRODUCTION:**

*Clause 1* is the Title clause.

*Clause 2* is the commencement clause. It provides for the Bill to come into force on **1 July 2011**.

#### **Part 1**

##### ***Preliminary provisions***

This Part contains 4 subparts.

***Subpart 1 to 4*** provide an overview of the general scheme and effect of the Bill (*clause 3*); detailing its purpose, interpretation, some key pertinent definitions, and highlights the principle relationships between the Minister, Chief Executive and TA's, by defining roles & responsibilities.

As noted earlier, the terms safety and suitability are defined in *clause 11*.

- ❑ **Safety** is defined to mean a condition in which food, in terms of its intended use, is unlikely to cause or lead to illness or injury to human life or public health.

- ❑ **Suitability** is defined to mean a condition in which matters such as the composition, labelling, identification, and condition of food are appropriate in terms of its intended use.

## **Part 2**

### ***Risk-based measures***

**This Part contains 5 key subparts of particular importance.** It relates to risk-based measures, which are the primary instruments under the Bill for ensuring that food businesses achieve safe and suitable food. Every person who trades in food must, subject to certain exceptions, operate the person's food business under the risk-based measure that applies to the food sector that the food business is in.

There are 4 types of risk-based measures under the Bill. These are as follows:

- ❑ a food control plan:
- ❑ a national programme:
- ❑ a monitoring programme:
- ❑ food handler guidance.

#### ***Subpart 1—***

- ❑ classifies food sectors into 3 risk classes (as specified in *Schedules 1 to 3*) based on, among other things, the level of risk that their activities pose to public health; and
- ❑ assigns a risk-based measure that generally applies to food businesses in each of those classes (*clause 20*).
- ❑ In addition, *subpart 1—*
- ❑ sets out rules for determining the risk-based measure that applies to a food business that is not classified in any of *Schedules 1 to 3* or a food business carrying out activities that overlap 2 or more food sectors (*clauses 22 and 23*):
- ❑ clarifies that an operator of a food business may choose to operate under a food control plan even if the risk-based measure that would generally apply to the food business is not a food control plan (*clause 24*):
- ❑ sets out the requirement for every person trading in food to operate under the risk-based measure that applies to the food sector that the food business is in, unless certain specified exceptions apply (*clauses 25 and 26*).

### ***Subpart 2—***

- ❑ sets out requirements about the nature, content, and effect of a food control plan; and
- ❑ requires the registration of food control plans (*clauses 27 to 69*).

A food control plan is a plan to identify, control, manage, and eliminate or minimise hazards or other relevant factors for the purpose of achieving safe and suitable food (*clause 28*). A food control plan may be individually developed for each person or food business. Alternatively, it may be developed by a person or food business and then adopted and amended to suit the operations of some other person or food business (*clause 29*).

### ***Subpart 3***

- ❑ sets out requirements about the nature, content, and effect of a national programme (*clauses 70 to 84*).

A national programme is a programme designed to identify, control, manage, and eliminate or minimise hazards or other relevant factors for the purpose of achieving safe and suitable food (*clause 71*). It is imposed by regulations and, if required, supplemented by specifications set by the chief executive of the Ministry (*clause 72*). An operator of a food business that is subject to a national programme is required to register the food business in accordance with regulations made under the Bill (*clause 76*). Those regulations may also prescribe requirements for the suspension, cancellation, or surrender of the registration of a food business that is subject to a national programme (*clause 73*).

### ***Subpart 4***

- ❑ sets out provisions about the nature, content, and effect of a monitoring programme (*clauses 85 to 90*).

A monitoring programme is used to impose, in certain specified circumstances, monitoring measures and related activities that are necessary, among other things, for determining the safety and suitability of food and for ensuring the effectiveness of the food safety regime (*clause 86(1)*).

It may be imposed on any food sector even though the sector is already subject to other risk-based measures (*clause 86(3)*). It is imposed by way of regulations made under the Bill and, if required, by a notice issued by the chief executive of the Ministry (*clause 88*).

### ***Subpart 5***

- sets out provisions about the nature and effect of food handler guidance (*clauses 91 to 96*).

Food handler guidance is guidance issued by a registration authority (the chief executive of the Ministry or a territorial authority) about the steps that are necessary to achieve safe and suitable food. It is intended to be educative only and does not, on its own, impose any duties on a person or food business that is subject to it (*clause 92*). A person or food business that is subject to food handler guidance is not required to operate under a food control plan, national programme, or monitoring programme and is not subject to the verification requirements of the Bill (*clause 93*).

A person who is not ordinarily in the business of trading in food but who organises a community-based fund-raising activity that involves trading in food is exempt from the requirement to operate under a registered food control plan or a national programme (*clause 94*). In addition, the chief executive or the chief executive's delegate may exempt any person, group of persons, or any type or description of food business within a food sector from the requirement to operate under a registered food control plan or a national programme (*clauses 95 and 96*).

### **Part 3**

#### ***Food imported for purpose of sale***

*Clause 97* states the purpose of this Part, which is to require the safety and suitability of food imported for the purpose of sale and to provide for the registration of certain importers of that food.

*Clause 98* is an interpretation clause for this Part. It provides that a reference to food imported for the purpose of sale includes a reference to food that is imported for processing and handling and is subsequently exported.

*Clause 99* provides that a person must not import food for the purpose of sale unless the person is a registered importer or is importing the food through an agent who is a registered importer.

It also provides that the importation of food in a quantity that is more than that which a reasonable person would consider to be reasonably required for personal consumption must, unless the contrary is proved, be treated as an importation of the food for the purpose of sale.

*Clause 100* enables a food safety officer to give any imported food a clearance for entry into New Zealand in certain circumstances. A food safety officer may give a clearance for entry unconditionally or subject to any conditions that the officer thinks necessary or desirable to achieve the safety and suitability of the food.

*Clauses 101 and 102* set out the duties of, respectively, an importer and a registered importer.

*Clauses 103 to 112* provide for various matters relating to the registration of importers, including—

- ❑ who must be registered (*clause 103*);
- ❑ how an application for registration is to be made (*clause 104*);
- ❑ the powers of the chief executive in relation to an application for registration (*clauses 105 and 106*);
- ❑ the criteria for approving an application for registration (*clause 107*);
- ❑ how long a registration remains in effect (*clause 110*);
- ❑ the duty of a registered importer to notify the chief executive of any significant change in circumstances, including any matter that may result in the registered importer not meeting the criteria for registration (*clause 112*).

*Clauses 113 to 116* deal with the suspension of a registered importer's operations. The chief executive may, at any time, suspend all or any specified part of a registered importer's operations for an initial period of up to 3 months if the chief executive considers that the food imported by the importer may pose a risk to human life or public health or that there are matters that cast doubt on the safety and suitability of the food. A registered importer may also voluntarily suspend all of the importer's operations for an initial period of at least 3 months, unless the chief executive approves a shorter period.

*Clauses 117 to 122* provide for the removal of an importer's name from the relevant public register if the chief executive cancels, or records the surrender of, that importer's registration.

## **Part 4**

### ***Provisions relating to recognition, territorial authorities, administration, and enforcement***

This Part contains 6 subparts.

***Subpart 1*** provides for the recognition of agencies and persons who carry out certain functions and activities under the Bill. Under this subpart, the chief executive may recognise—

- ❑ agencies that are responsible for managing and carrying out verification functions and activities and other specialist functions and activities and agencies that may manage and supply recognised persons:
- ❑ persons who carry out verification functions and activities and other specialist functions and activities.

In this context, verification (as defined in *clause 7*) includes the application of methods, procedures, tests, and other checks to confirm compliance with the applicable requirements of the Bill or compliance of a food business with a risk management tool.

***Subpart 1*** also provides for—

- ❑ the duties of recognised agencies and recognised persons (*clauses 124 and 125*):
- ❑ the procedures, criteria, and other matters relating to the grant of recognition by the chief executive (*clauses 126 to 137*):
- ❑ the suspension of the recognition of an agency or a person (*clauses 138 to 140*):
- ❑ the removal of the name of a recognised agency or recognised person from the relevant public register on the withdrawal or surrender of the agency's or person's recognition (*clauses 141 to 144*):
- ❑ the protection of the Crown, the chief executive, and any employee of the Ministry from any liability for loss arising through the actions or omissions of a recognised agency or recognised person (*clause 145*).

***Subpart 2***—

- ❑ sets out certain functions and duties of territorial authorities under the Bill (*clauses 146 and 147*):
- ❑ enables the Minister to issue national outcomes in relation to the performance or exercise by territorial authorities of functions, duties, and powers under the Bill (*clause 148*):
- ❑ provides that a territorial authority may, under the Local Government Act 2002, transfer its functions, duties, and powers to another territorial authority or to a regional council if the

other territorial authority or regional council agrees in writing to the transfer and is able to meet any national outcomes issued by the Minister (*clauses 149 to 151*):

- ❑ provides that a territorial authority may transfer its functions, duties, and powers to the chief executive if the chief executive agrees to the transfer (*clauses 152 to 156*):
- ❑ sets out the power of the chief executive to monitor the performance of functions and duties and the exercise of powers by territorial authorities under the Bill (*clause 157*):
- ❑ provides that the Minister may initiate a review of the performance of functions and duties and the exercise of powers by territorial authorities under the Bill (*clauses 158 to 164*).

### ***Subpart 3***

- ❑ sets out principles and methods (including fees, charges, or levies) in relation to the recovery of the direct and indirect costs of the Ministry in administering the Bill that are not provided for by money that is funded by the Crown for the purpose (*clauses 170 to 184*).

### ***Subpart 4***

- ❑ allows penalties to be imposed or, as the case may be, waived in relation to any unpaid fees, charges, or levies that are required to be paid to the Ministry (*clauses 185 to 187*).

### ***Subpart 5***

relates to offences. In particular, it—

- ❑ establishes an infringement offences regime (*clauses 188 to 191*):
- ❑ sets out offences against the Act (*clauses 192 to 213*):
- ❑ sets out rules on criminal liability for offences under the Act (*clauses 214 to 218*):
- ❑ extends the time within which an information for an offence against the Act can be laid (*clause 219*):
- ❑ describes defences available in prosecutions under the Act (*clauses 220 to 226*):
- ❑ contains evidential rules for prosecutions under the Act (*clauses 227 to 229*):
- ❑ provides for certain presumptions to be used in prosecutions under the Act (*clauses 230 to 234*):
- ❑ deals with sentencing for offences prosecuted under the Act (*clauses 235 to 242*).

***Subpart 6*** relates to powers and enforcement. In particular, it—

- ❑ enables the chief executive of the Ministry to appoint food safety officers and suspend or cancel appointments (*clauses 243 and 244*):

- ❑ empowers the chief executive of the Ministry to give directions to protect the safety and suitability of food (*clauses 245 to 256*):
- ❑ specifies the powers of the chief executive of the Ministry to publish statements about the safety and suitability of food (*clauses 257 and 258*):
- ❑ gives the chief executive of the Ministry power to approve documents, materials, or facilities, or persons or classes of persons, if the approval is required by a requirement of the Act (*clause 259*):
- ❑ sets out the powers of the chief executive of the Ministry to gather information (*clauses 260 and 261*):
- ❑ sets out the powers of verifiers (*clause 262*):
- ❑ provides for the powers and duties of food safety officers (*clauses 263 to 288*):
- ❑ imposes controls on the issue and use of search warrants (*clauses 289 to 300*):
- ❑ describes the compliance order regime (*clauses 301 to 313*).

## **Part 5**

### ***Miscellaneous provisions***

This Part contains 8 subparts.

***Subpart 1*** enables—

- ❑ the Governor-General, by Order in Council made on the recommendation of the Minister, to make regulations to exempt certain things or certain classes of persons or operations from the application of all or any provisions of the Bill (*clause 314*):
- ❑ the Governor-General, by Order in Council made on the recommendation of the Minister, to make regulations to exempt food that is to be exported to a destination other than Australia from the requirements of adopted joint food standards or domestic food standards and food that is to be exported to any destination from the requirements of any regulations made under *clause 346* or any notices made under *clause 367* (*clause 316*):
- ❑ the chief executive, by notice under *clause 367*, to exempt food that is to be exported from the same requirements, and with largely the same effect, as those described in *clause 316* (*clause 318*).
- ❑ *Subpart 1* also exempts certain persons covered by the Animal Products Act 1999 or the Wine Act 2003 from the requirement to operate under a registered food control plan or a national programme (*clauses 320 and 321*).

***Subpart 2***—

- ❑ protects persons performing their functions or duties, or exercising their powers, under the Act from civil and criminal liability (*clause 322*):
- ❑ enables the chief executive of the Ministry to delegate functions, duties, and powers under the Act (*clause 323*):
- ❑ facilitates the review of decisions under the Act (*clauses 324 to 330*).

**Subpart 3** deals with information and consultation requirements. In particular, it—

- ❑ enables the chief executive of the Ministry to collect information and impose controls on the disclosure of information (*clauses 331 to 337*):
- ❑ states rules on notifying persons of information under the Act (*clauses 338 to 340*):
- ❑ requires the Minister and the chief executive to consult on matters under the Act (*clauses 341 to 343*).

**Subpart 4** provides for regulations to be made under the Act, including regulations about—

- ❑ standards in relation to food (*clause 346*):
- ❑ risk management tools and related matters (*clause 347*):
- ❑ grading schemes that provide consumers with information about the level of a food business's compliance with the food safety regime (*clause 348*):
- ❑ imported food (*clause 350*):
- ❑ offences (*clause 353*):
- ❑ administrative matters (*clause 354*).

**Subpart 5** enables the Minister to—

- ❑ adopt joint food standards in order to give effect to New Zealand's obligations under the Australia–New Zealand Joint Food Standards Agreement (*clauses 358 to 364*):
- ❑ issue, in certain limited and exceptional circumstances, domestic food standards separately from those set out in the Australia New Zealand Joint Food Standards Code (*clauses 365 and 366*).

**Subpart 6** provides for notices to be issued under the Act (*clauses 367 to 372*), including emergency notices for emergency or urgent situations that create a risk of death or serious harm to any person (*clause 370*).

**Subpart 7** contains transitional provisions that—

- ❑ provide for food sectors to make their transition on a staggered basis from the existing requirements of the Food Act 1981, the Food Hygiene Regulations 1974, and the Food (Safety) Regulations 2002 to the new requirements of the Bill when enacted (*clauses 373 to 378*); and
- ❑ explain the status of existing legislative requirements, food standards, and other matters on or after the enactment of the Bill (*clauses 379 to 384*); and
- ❑ clarify when some of the new provisions of the Bill will apply (*clauses 385 to 388*); and
- ❑ treat certain food safety programmes that are in force on the enactment of the Bill as deemed food control plans (*clauses 389 to 392*); and
- ❑ explain the status of food businesses not previously covered by food legislation (*clause 393*); and
- ❑ explain the status of approved auditors and agencies managing approved auditors under the Food Act 1981 on or after the enactment of the Bill (*clauses 394 to 396*); and
- ❑ enable the making of regulations about transitional matters and the recovery of costs incurred during the transitional period (*clauses 397 to 400*); and
- ❑ provide requirements for notices issued by the chief executive in relation to transitional matters (*clause 401*).

**Subpart 8** deals with a miscellany of matters. In particular, it—

- ❑ states that *Schedule 5* contains further provisions on public registers (*clause 402*);
- ❑ sets out rules on the incorporation by reference of material in regulations, Orders in Council, and notices (*clauses 403 and 404*);
- ❑ explains the relationship between regulations, Orders in Council, and notices made under the Bill and local authority bylaws (*clause 405*);
- ❑ states that *Schedule 7* contains consequential amendments, repeals, and revocations (*clause 406*).

## **SCHEDULES**

- ❑ *Schedule 1* describes the food sectors that are generally subject to a food control plan.
- ❑ *Schedule 2* describes the food sectors that are generally subject to a national programme.
- ❑ *Schedule 3* describes the food sectors that are generally subject to food handler guidance.
- ❑ *Schedule 4* contains miscellaneous provisions for registrations and recognitions.
- ❑ *Schedule 5* gives details about public registers.
- ❑ *Schedule 6* elaborates on the incorporation of material by reference.
- ❑ *Schedule 7* contains consequential amendments, repeals, and revocations.

### **CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS:**

Although the Bill should be considered as a whole, the main area of most interest for Territorial Authorities is Part 4, Sub-part 2 – Territorial Authorities - *Functions and duties of territorial authorities*. This has been well documented and discussed above.

***It is therefore, recommended that Council provide a submission supporting the food bill, with the following inclusion:***

- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations about national programmes
- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations that may impose fees and charges, waivers, levies and refunds.
- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations about core provisions
- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations about standards in relation to food
- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations about risk management and related matters
- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations about grading schemes
- ❑ Clarification is needed regarding the regulations about offences, including specific detail on the nature of what would be deemed to be an infringement, and the use of infringement notices.

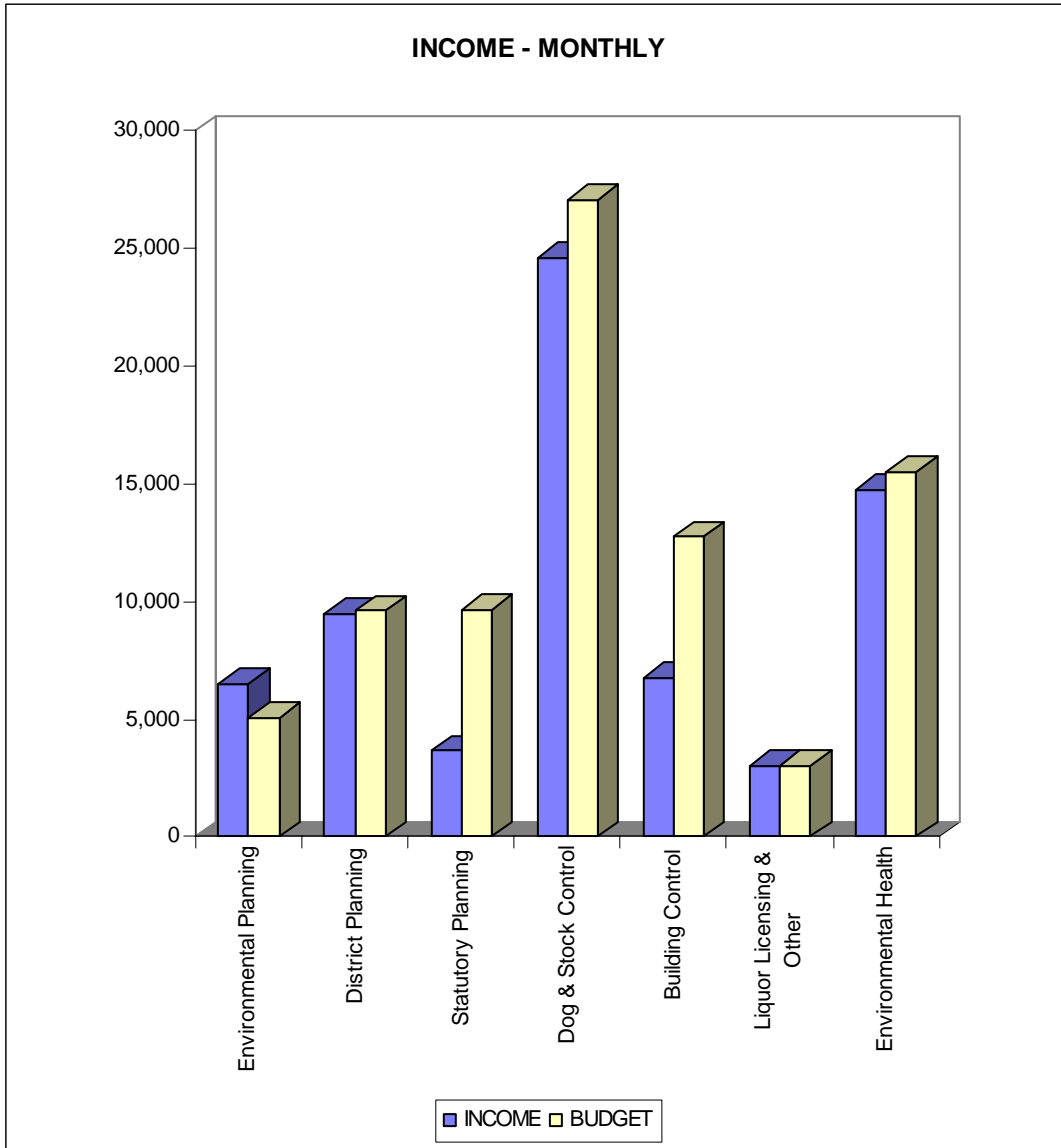
